Lesson 7: 1 & 2 Chronicles, Ezra, Nehemiah

Note: an on-line site like https://biblehub.com/ -- enables rapid navigation to listed texts

- 1 & 2 Chronicles focus on descendants of Judah & Levi, especially thru David's line; David was a *type* of Jesus & God protected the line until the Savior Messiah was born (Galatians 4:4-5)
- These books have a different focus than 1 & 2 Samuel and 1 & 2 Kings; they do not deny or obviate anything in those books, but provide a selective history of God's people

Jesus in 1 Chronicles

- 1 Chronicles gave the Israelites returning from captivity links to their ancestors & to God; also connects us "grafted-in" children of God (Romans 8:12-25; Galatians 3:26-4:7) to Jesus (Hebrews 2:10-18)
- Chapters 1-9 list genealogies, which were extremely important for Jews: proved one's identity as a Jew, a partaker of blessings promised by God to the patriarchs & part of the nation chosen by God
 - o Traceability of one's family history was required in order to inherit land within the allocated tribal area
 - o To serve as a priest, one had to prove descent from Aaron
 - o Genealogies emphasized the importance of the family unit in the culture & continuing the family line
 - o The Messiah had to be from David's line (Isaiah 11:10)--Jesus was (Matthew 1:1-16; Luke 3:23-38)
 - o Unknown names listed in God's Word give assurance that no one is unimportant in God's Kingdom
- Saul lost everything because he turned from God to do things his own way (*v10:13-14*); but "David became more and more powerful because the Lord was with him." (*v11:9*) ¹
 - o The difference between Saul & David may be compared with that between Adam & Jesus: Adam listened to Satan's influence rather than God's; Jesus ("2nd Adam") was sent to correct the damage
 - o Saul & David summarize the story of humanity; Saul reminds us of our own sin while David points forward to Jesus, who died to restore us to a right relationship with God (**Romans 5:19**)
- After careful prep (v15:13-16) David brought the ark of the covenant to Jerusalem (v15:25-28; 16:1)
 - o After sacrifices & offerings, David blessed the people, fed them & appointed leaders to make petition, give thanks & praise to God (*v16:2-4*); Jesus also regularly thanked & glorified the Father (**Luke 10:21**)
 - We need to give thanks & praise to Jesus & the Spirit for always being with us (1 Thessalonians 5:18)
- David never forgot his background as a simple shepherd & believed God's promises (v17:16-19)
 - o God promised the Messiah: 1) from his line (*v17:11*; **Matthew 1:1**; **9:27**); 2) reign on his throne forever (*v17:12-13*; **Luke 1:32-33**); 3) be God's son (*v17:13*; **Hebrews 1:5**)
 - Like sheep, people need 1) guidance, lest they wander (Judges 21:25); 2) protection from enemies (1 Samuel 17:34-37); 3) to be fed--sheep physically, but people spiritually by God's Word (Matthew 4:4)
 - o Jesus referred to Himself as <u>the</u> good shepherd (**John 10:11,14**) & filled all roles (**John 10:3-4,15,10**); also, shepherd of "those who have washed their robes in the blood of the Lamb." (**Revelation 7:14-17**)
- David led Israel in worship of God; one view--giving to God to express how much He is worth to us
 - Worship includes praise (*v29:10-13*); obedience (**Philippians 2:15-16**); talents/gifts (**Romans 12:6-8**); financial (*v29:2-6,9*): in sum, giving ourselves & all we do (*v29:18*; 1 Peter 4:11; Romans 12:1-2²)

Jesus in 2 Chronicles

- Mount Moriah was where: Abraham took Isaac for sacrifice; David bought land for the temple (1 Chronicles 21:18,25; *v3:1*); Jesus was presented (Luke 2:22), cleansed (John 2:13-16; Mark 11:15-17) & often taught
 - o Jesus' death removed our separation from God, as shown by tearing of the temple curtain (Mark 15:38)
 - We are "living Mount Moriah's"--the Holy Spirit dwells within us (1 Corinthians 3:16; 6:19-20)

- The LORD appeared to Solomon & warned him of consequences if he turned from God (v7:19-22)
 - o Solomon & Israel did turn from God & suffered those very consequences (v36:19)
 - o But God had also promised a Savior from David's line (Isaiah 11:1; Jeremiah 23:5-6; Amos 9:11)
 - o Jesus was that saving "Son of David" (**Matthew 1:1; 12:22-23**); He did not come to save them politically from Rome's domination as they expected, but spiritually from sin's bondage (**Acts 13:38-39**)
- The queen of Sheba came to test Solomon's wisdom (v1:10-12; 9:1); Jesus cited this visit in condemnation of those who had the Son of God in their midst, yet rejected Him (Luke 11:29-32)
- Solomon's son Rehoboam listened to the voice of pride (v10:13-15) so the northern tribes left Judah (v10:16)
 - o Though their complaint was valid, in rejecting the rule of David's line they rejected the Messiah
 - o Many voices call us to follow; we must heed God's Word & listen to our Good Shepherd (John 10:1-3)
- There were many false prophets in Israel, but Micaiah spoke God's truth (v18:7) even at risk to his life
 - o Like many today, Ahab wanted to choose his own way, yet wanted God's approval (v18:16-17)
 - o People that rejected Jesus because of His "hard sayings" rejected God's life-giving truth (**John 6:60-66**); the 12 stayed loyal not because they understood what He said, but they knew who He was (**John 6:68-69**)
- Jehoshaphat referred to Abraham as God's friend (*v20:7*); Jesus was criticized for being friends with tax collectors & sinners (**Matthew 11:19**)--such friendship was based on Jesus' character, not theirs
 - o Jesus says we are His friends "if you do what I command" & orders: "love one another" (John 15:14,17)
- Hezekiah brought Judah to revival in the LORD thru restored temple worship, feasts & offerings (v29:24-36)
 - o Jesus set the standard for how we can truly worship God in offering ourselves (John 13:15; 1 Peter 2:21)
- Chapter 36 reports how the kings & people of Judah turned from God (*v36:13-14*) leading to captivity in Babylon (*v36:17-21*) in fulfilment of the curses of which the LORD had warned (*v7:19-22*)
 - o God had not abandoned His people; after their "timeout," He would stir Cyrus to release them (v36:22-23)
 - o Jesus will never abandon us either--He always keeps His promises (Romans 8:38-39; Hebrews 13:5)

<u>Jesus in Ezra</u> (in the Hebrew Scripture, Ezra & Nehemiah are together as one book)

- Ezra relates the story of the return of God's people from Babylon back to Jerusalem, as prophesied; Isaiah even gave the name "Cyrus" ~200 years before the return (**Isaiah 44:28; 45:1,13; Jeremiah 29:1-3**)
- Even when our world seems spinning out of control, our God is always in control! God can even use non-believers to carry out His purposes (**Proverbs 21:1**), just as Jesus told Pilate (**John 19:10-11**)
 - o God moved the hearts of people to participate in/support the rebuilding of the temple (*v1:5-6*), as He disclosed the truth about Jesus to Peter (**Matthew 16:17**) & as He can move us in doing His work
- Zerubbabel, who was in the line from David to Jesus (**Matthew 1:12-13**) was appointed governor of Judah (**Haggai 1:1**) & began rebuilding the temple in Jerusalem (*v3:2-2*)
 - o After the foundation was laid, Samaritan opposition held up further construction for 17 years until the prophets Haggai & Zechariah encouraged resumption (& effort to overcome the opposition) (v5:1-2)
 - Some thought this temple poor compared to the 1st, but 500 years later Jesus would fulfil prophecy of greater glory (Haggai 2:3-9) when He walked the grounds (Luke 2:22,46; 20:1)
- Ezra grieved over the compromises with the cultures around them (*v9:1-4*); his praying, confessing & weeping brought repentance & a return to God's commands that prophets rarely saw (*v10:1-4*)
 - o Jesus also called people to repent (Matthew 4:17) & turn to God's way of living (Matthew 5:1-7:29)

Jesus in Nehemiah

- God called Nehemiah to Jerusalem to lead the rebuilding of the city wall (v1:3-4; 2:5)
 The wall was rebuilt from the rubble, just as are we when we place our trust in Jesus (Luke 15:11-32)
- Nehemiah got angry that some were taking advantage of others during famine & took action (v5:3-6,9-11)
 - o Jesus was always focused on the needy (Luke 4:18) & asks us to minister to them (Matthew 25:35-40)
- Ezra's reading of God's Word brought revival & zeal for the LORD (*v8:1-9*); it will do the same for you: "Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God." (**Matthew 4:4**)
